NEW DIMENSIONS OF PYSANKA ART

March 6 to April 9, 2016



Three generations of Wasylyshens are featured in this exhibition: father Ted, mother Eleanor, son David, and grandson Derek. Their works represent something quite apart from, yet akin to the pysanka tradition.

The Wasylyshens, literally and figuratively, deconstruct the pysanka in form and function to create a new work of art referred to as a pysanka mosaic. This involves cutting up a great number of pysanky into a myriad of pieces of various shapes and sizes, and working them into an original image often creating a three dimensional effect. Ted conceived this technique, David perfected it. David's son, Derek, has developed his own particular pysanka mosaic style incorporating glass fusing and slumping techniques

In addition, the exhibition features the Wasylyshen Collection of pysanky displaying the breadth and scope of this traditional folk art and illustrating regional pysanka designs, as well as styles of individual pysanka artisans.

30th Anniversary of Chornobyl Disaster

David McMillan has been traveling to Chernobyl and Pripyat, Ukraine, since 1994 to photograph the 30-kilometre contaminated zone around the Chernobyl Nuclear Power Plant; a reactor meltdown in 1986 left the city uninhabitable.


McMillan's haunting images depict a city simultaneously suspended in time and undergoing constant change. As statues of Lenin and evidence of Soviet rule continue to adorn the walls of schools and government buildings, the growth of vegetation and crumbling architecture is gradually erasing the referents that have shaped the city's memory. Chernobyl and Pripyat are cities left in a state of

constant flux, with time made tangible through the spaces re-photographed year after year.

Meanwhile, photographs of found arrangements of objects and vegetation on the crumbling buildings' floors create an aesthetic space between growth and decay, suggesting layered assemblages, abstract sculptures, or textured paintings created through chance encounters.

A Broken Pysanka

Not all broken pysanky are lost to posterity. An unusual pysanka written by Tetiana Koshetz (1892-1966) has been preserved by fusing its retrievable fragments with beeswax to reconstruct her creation. This pysanka incorporates traditional motifs, such as the sun, the church and the *bezkonechnyk*, literally a line without a beginning or end representing the flow of eternity. It also introduces an atypical element into the design.

Tetiana uses the five horizontal lines employed in music notation (called a stave) as parallel *bezkonechnyky* (lines without end) wrapping them around the egg. She fills the lines with musical

notes and places lyrics below the music, as if the egg were a special type of organic sheet of music. Curators and cataloguers at Oseredok have often wondered whether the notes and lyrics represented some particular song or were purely decorative, arbitrary, or symbolic.

It turns out that both the lyrics and the music are very real and correspond to a variant of an ancient *hahilka/vesnianka* (spring song and dance) called *Kryvyi tanets'* or Crooked Dance. In this *vesnianka* a single line of girls moves rhythmically across a triangular area in a meandering pattern, much akin to the meandering pattern of the *bezkonechnyk*.

Given that Tetiana Koshetz, an ethnographer in her own right, taught *vesnianky* to girls in Winnipeg on many occasions, one should not be surprised by a *vesnianka* written on her pysanka. In fact, this particular spring song could be traced to a manuscript written by Oleksander Koshetz (1874-1944), the renowned ethnomusicologist and, coincidentally, the husband of Tetiana. A search into the Oleksander Koshetz archive yielded a file labeled *Vesnianky*, *1921*, file no. 43/20, in box 43 and inside, listed as No. 15, was *Kryvyi tanets'* with the same words and melody as on the pysanka.

We found the line in the manuscript that corresponds to the pysanka fragment in the photo and put the two together to tell you this story.



Oseredok is already getting ready for its Annual General Meeting. There is much to do in order to meet our obligations for accountability and transparency: an external audit of our financial operations, preparation of donor lists, selection of material, writing and designing the Annual Report, preparation of donor lists, among others.

One aspect of this preparation process is making sure there is a succession plan for the renewal of the Board of Directors and Audit Committee. The Nominating Committee, chaired this year by Anne Rusnak, has been tracking directors' terms of office, reviewing the skill set that needs to be replaced on the board, and ensuring that a fair nominating process is in place.

The Board consists of 12 directors, each elected for a three year term. The terms are staggered in such a way that only four vacancies need to be filled every year. Directors are allowed to stand for re-election, but must step off the board when they have served three consecutive three-year terms.

The Board puts out a Call for Nominations listing the obligations of becoming a director and, if you are interested in putting your name forward, you must fill out an application for nomination. These applications are available at the front desk at Oseredok or you may request them by email (ucec@mymts.net). The deadline for submission of applications is May 2, 2016.
