

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

2021/2022 started out as most fiscal years at Oseredok. Covid was still with us but we persevered.

In 2020, the Reading Room and Research Centre Project was started to provide opportunities for children of all ages to have access to books, workshops, readings and programs regarding Ukrainian culture. This space is also available to researchers to have access to the many books, newspapers, and articles that we have in the library. The official grand opening was held on August 18, 2021. I would like to acknowledge and thank the major supporter of this initiative, St. Boniface Ukrainian Foundation Inc. for making this possible.

In September, our annual Volunteer Appreciation event was held to recognize the volunteers who play an integral role in this organization. Every person who contributes to Oseredok in any way, big or small, is so greatly appreciated and words cannot express the gratitude we feel.

Covid continued to impact fundraising activities that would be in accordance with healthcare directives. Although restrictions were lifted somewhat, we still had to be creative and innovative on how to handle them. One of the first events was the "Pop-up Pyvo Patio Event" held in the Oseredok parking lot. In spite of the rain, everyone had a great time.

At the Great Canadian Kutia Cook Off in December, five chefs had the opportunity of showcasing their kutia recipes and what was most interesting was that each one was very different. Attendees were able to sample them and vote on their favourite.

The Festival of Carols was online once again and was a huge success. Thanks go out to all the performers for their contributions to the program and bringing the spirit of the Christmas season in to everyone's homes. We are happy to announce that Oseredok successfully implemented a new collections management system. Soon anyone with an internet connection can browse our museum artifacts, fine art pieces, archival materials. Oseredok collections will virtually open the doors to everyone wishing to discover Ukrainian culture!

Covid was the incentive for us to put the Boutique online and so far, it has been very well received. There were also exhibitions, workshops, and presentations that continued to keep Oseredok at the forefront of providing information to the general community on Ukrainian traditions and culture.

Then on February 24, 2022, the unthinkable happened, Russia invaded Ukraine and the world changed. Ukrainians everywhere rallied together to provide humanitarian aid, munitions, and any type of support that was needed to ensure that Ukraine will not succumb to the Russians. The impact on the diaspora was immediate and swift and everyone rose to the challenge. Everyone's focus, including Oseredok's, changed to finding ways of supporting Ukraine. Coordinated efforts and support not only from the Ukrainian community but from the community at large, has been so tremendous and heartwarming. With everyone's help, Ukraine will win this warl

MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



As Oseredok's new fiscal year begins, I have been reflecting on how fortunate we are to be a part of our incredible community that is changing the world for the better. True to our legacy since we were established 77 years ago, the Centre's strong and closely connected community of volunteers, members, staff and Board of Directors have worked together to preserve, promote and celebrate our history and culture.

Last year was a year of great progress and achievements for Oseredok!

Collections. Oseredok implemented a collections management system, which ensures management of all our collections through four different modules: museum, fine art, archives, and library. The new collections management system has an online catalogue and helps us fulfill our mission statement to share and promote Ukrainian-Canadian and Ukrainian culture and heritage. The collections management system puts Oseredok on the map as one of the first Ukrainian Heritage institutions to offer online access to the entire museum collection with supportive descriptive and provenance information. Oseredok has also launched a Digital Preservation initiative aiming to collect cultural, archival and/or research material in digital format for safekeeping during the war period in Ukraine.

Fundraising. Oseredok worked hard and was fortunate to receive an outstanding amount of support through grants, which led to us having the ability to hire multiple interns during the year, purchase software for our collections management and launch St. Boniface Foundation Reading Room and Research Centre. Oseredok hosted its first in-person event since the pandemic started in the form of our Pyvo Patio Fundraiser, which was an incredibly enjoyable and entertaining evening that brought our community together again. In 2021 Oseredok implemented a new database for all of our information on donors and members

Exhibitions. This year Oseredok hosted a number of exhibitions in our galleries. We featured the works of Ukrainian-Canadian artist Orysia Sinitowich-Gorski in our exhibition lskry-Living Embers; Manitoba 150-Celebrating Our Voices! Curated by Ben Wasylyshen: an exhibition which invited visitors to learn about, interact with, and celebrate the many generations of Ukrainians who have made Manitoba their homes; partnered with artist and curator Kerri Parnell for Pause

in Plight, an exhibition of artworks exploring the subject of Canada's first world war internment operations. Not only were each of the above exhibitions digitized and made available as virtual walk-throughs, Oseredok also hosted two virtual exhibitions. Peculiar Pysanky shone a spotlight on a number of the unique pysanky from the Oseredok. Demolition of the Salter Street Bridge and Construction of the Slaw Rebchuk Bridge on a Daily Basis from 1983-1984 featured the photography of Winnipeg artist Alexander Kulchynsky as he chronicled the changing face of Winnipeg through his photographs.

Boutique. This previous year saw significant changes happen to Oseredok's boutique. The incorporation of POS system helps us better track our inventory and ensure day-to-day sales proceed as smoothly as possible. Oseredok also launched its online store in December 2021, which aided in the Christmas Fair's historical sales figures of over \$20,000.

I want to thank and acknowledge the people we serve - our community and their families. Thank you to our stellar employees for their creativity, support, and outstanding professionalism: O. Sloboda, K. Yablecki, A. Shkandrij, A. Quagleini, and H. Picklyk.

EXHIBITIONS


This year Oseredok adapted all our exhibitions and permanent exhibits to include a virtual component as we adapted all of our exhibitions to changing safety protocols. This allowed for Oseredok to greatly increase our viewership, expanding our reach to include visitors from around the globe.

ISKRY-LIVING EMBERS | ICKPИ

CURATED BY ORYSIA SINITOWICH GORSKI 5 MAY, 2021–31 JULY 2022

The Iskry–Living Embers exhibition highlighted the works of Orysia Sinitowich Gorski, a third-generation Ukrainian-Canadian artist from Hafford, Saskatchewan. The exhibition featured nearly sixty of Gorski's works including those in Oseredok's collection, never previously shown works from the artist, and many others in the hands of private collectors. Gorski is an accomplished artist who has exhibited her works in shows at Oseredok Ukrainian Cultural and Educational Centre, Winnipeg City Hall, the Ukrainian Canadian Congress, and in shows across Canada and the United States. The exhibition opened online with viewers from cities across North America and Europe in attendance.

Oseredok was also happy to contribute virtual programming and expanded accessibility to compliment this exhibit during its display.



PECULIAR PYSANKY | HE3BNYHI ПИСАНКИ

CURATED BY OSEREDOK UKRAINIAN CULTURAL AND EDUCATIONAL CENTRE SPRING 2021

Ukrainians have been creating pysanky, decorative eggs produced using a wax resist method, for countless generations. Pysanky take their name from the Ukrainian word 'pysaty' meaning 'to write' in reference to the method used by artists as they draw or 'write' their designs onto the eggshell.

While Oseredok's collection of more than 4,000 pysanky contains many excellent examples of traditional symbols and motifs, Oseredok also has some unusual examples of this diverse art form. Highlighted in this exhibition were six customary representations of pysanky which emphasized just how varied this form of creative expression can be when practiced by Ukrainians in Canada and beyond.

This entirely virtual exhibition allowed visitors to explore each artwork on display in 360 degrees, and sought to delight visitors by sharing little known facts about this recognizable art-form.



MANITOBA 150-CELEBRATING OUR VOICES! СВЯТКУЄМО НАШІ ГОЛОСИ!

CURATED BY BEN WASYLYSHEN 30 JUNE, 2021-11 OCTOBER, 2021

The Manitoba 150 exhibition was an immersive, multi-dimensional experience created in response to the real stories of Manitobans. Members of several generations were invited to share their thoughts about being a Manitoban in the past and present. Viewers of the exhibition were welcomed to follow the individuals chosen, and to stand next to them to get to know them through their personal thoughts, expressions, and artifacts. These stories were in turn enhanced by museum treasures chosen from Oseredok's vast collection.

To supplement this exhibition, Oseredok created a curator's tour video which emphasized the history of Ukrainians in Manitoba, personal experiences of Ukrainians interviewed for the exhibition and the creative process of the curator. Oseredok also hosted an opening celebration for the exhibition on September 15, 2021. Finally, Oseredok created virtual content to supplement this exhibition and allow for visitors from around the globe to explore the creative installation

DEMOLITION OF THE SALTER STREET BRIDGE AND CONSTRUCTION OF THE **SLAW REBCHUK BRIDGE ON A DAILY BASIS FROM 1983-1984**

CURATED BY ALEXANDER KULCHYNSKY FALL 2021–ONGOING

This exhibition featured a selection of black and white photographs by Ukrainian-Canadian artist Alexander Kulchynsky from his collection of images chronicling Winnipeg. For Kulchynsky, what began as a way of commemorating the end of a fixture that stood in Winnipeg's North End for decades, the Demolition of the Salter Street Bridge and the Construction of the Slaw Rebchuk Bridge on a Daily Basis from 1983 to 1984 project became a multi-year documentation endeavour which captured the changing face of the city.

Images selected were hung on the walls of Oseredok and an online exhibition was created with supplementary content for viewers to learn more about the artist, his artworks, and Ukrainian Winnipeg. Oseredok also created video content to supplement the exhibition, including an interview with Alexander Kulchynsky exploring the inspiration for his photographs.



PAUSE IN PLIGHT | ПЕРЕРВАНА ОБІЦЯНКА CURATED BY KERRI PARNELL

29 OCTOBER, 2021-25 APRIL, 2022

This exhibition, curated by Winnipeg visual Artist Kerri Parnell, was made possible through support from the Canadian First World War Internment Recognition Fund and the Shevchenko Foundation. The exhibition included a series of artworks by Parnell that depicted the internment of Ukrainians and Eastern Europeans in Canada during the First World War. The exhibition was laid out in five different sections which included war posters, a light installation, the Emotional Interpretation Series, the Old Eyes Series, and a large-scale work titled To Hell with the Alien Enemy. The aim of this exhibition was to inform the public of Canada's WWI national security fears and wartime prejudices which led to the internment of 8,579 men, women and children, identified as "enemy aliens". Pause in Plight is a touring exhibition making its way across Canada between 2020-2025 to help bring awareness to this historical injustice.

The Pause in Plight exhibition included an opening reception on October 29, 2022, which featured original music by Winnipeg musician Keri Latimer, a live-streamed program, and an interactive theatrical performance. Oseredok also created an educational video distributed to schools across Canada which explored the relationship between art, education, and remembrance. As with all Oseredok exhibitions this year, Pause in Plight was made available virtually on the Oseredok website.



TRADITION TO MODERNITY: TREASURES FROM OSEREDOK'S COLLECTION

GERUS – MITRE

This beautiful mitre belonged to Rev. Dr. Serhij Gerus and was donated to Oseredok by his family this past fiscal year.

Rev. Gerus was born in Ukraine at the beginning of the 19th century. He carried out his pastoral service in Ukraine, Germany (Displaced Persons' camps), and Canada. In 1950 the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of Canada invited Rev. Gerus to Serve as a parish priest. Rev. Gerus was a Professor of Theology at St. Andrew's College at the University of Manitoba and was awarded an honorary Doctorate of Divinity from the College. His pastoral work was filled with

love and dedication to his Church and the people he served. As a recognition for his outstanding work, Rev. Gerus was awarded a mitre.

The most typical mitre in the Eastern Orthodox and Byzantine Catholic churches is based on the closed Imperial crown of the late Byzantine Empire. A cross surmounts the bishop's mitre but not a priestly mitre is not. Mitres are constructed of various materials (i.e. brocade, damask, gold cloth), and in many cases, are decorated with jewels and embroidery. While they come in gold most of the time, mitres do come in other liturgical colors. Additionally, there are four icons attached to the head covering. These are icons of Jesus Christ, the Theotokos, John the Baptist, and the Cross.

Rev. Gerus' mitre is made from a light blue velvet, covered in raised gold metallic embroidery in a floral design adorned with faux silver jewels and sequins. On the four sides of the mitre, there are small icons of Christ, Blessed Mary, John the Baptist, and Saint Paul and outlined in silver jewels with a jeweled crown design above.

Incorporation and nature of the organization 1.

Oseredok Ukrainian Cultural and Educational Centre (the "Centre") operates as a not-for-profit organization and is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act for the purpose of preserving and developing the culture and heritage of Ukrainian Canadians.

2. Significant accounting policies

The financial statements of the Centre have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-forprofit organizations and include the following significant accounting policies:

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include balances with banks and short-term investments with maturities of three months or less. Cash subject to restrictions that prevent its use for current purposes is included in restricted cash.

Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in ordinary course of business

Capital assets

Purchased capital assets are recorded at cost. Contributed capital assets are recorded at fair value at the date of contribution plus all costs directly attributable to the acquisition.

Amortization is provided using the straight-line method at rates intended to amortize the cost of assets over their estimated useful lives.

Buildings Computer equipment Furniture and fixtures

Acquisitions

Due to the limited staffing of the Centre for years ending up to and including March 31, 2010, the Centre was unable to determine the fair value of all contributed acquisitions received prior to April 1, 2010. Since April 1, 2010 all contributed acquisitions are recorded at fair value or at nominal value at the date of contribution. In addition, purchased acquisitions are recorded at cost. The Centre does not amortize acquisitions. Acquisitions consist of works of art, books, and items of cultural and historical significance to Ukrainian Canadians.

Revenue recognition

The Centre follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Membership revenue is deferred when received and recognized monthly as earned

Parking revenue is recognized on a monthly basis as received or receivable, and when collectibility is reasonably assured.

Programs revenue is recognized when it is delivered.

Boutique sales are recognized at the point of sale.

Interest income is recognized on a time proportional basis over the duration of the term deposit.

Government assistance

Claims for assistance under various government grant and subsidy programs are recorded in other revenue in the period in which eligible expenditures are incurred.

Contributed materials

Contributions of donated materials and services (with the exception of donated capital assets and acquisitions) are not recognized in the financial statements.

Financial instruments

The Centre recognizes its financial instruments when the Centre becomes party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument. All financial instruments are initially recorded at their fair value. At initial recognition, the Centre may irrevocably elect to subsequently measure any financial instrument at fair value. The Centre has not made such an election during the year. The Centre subsequently measures its financial instruments at cost or amortized cost, except for investments, if any, that are quoted in active market, which recognized at fair value. Amortized cost is the amount at which the financial instrument is measured at initial recognition less principal repayments, plus or minus the cumulative of any difference between the initial amount and the maturity amount, and minus any reduction for impairment.

Financial asset impairment:

The Centre assesses impairment of all of its financial assets measured at cost or amortized cost. The Centre groups assets for impairment testing when available information is not sufficient to permit identification of each individually impaired financial asset in the group. Management considers whether the issuer is having significant financial difficulty in determining whether objective evidence of impairment exists. When there is an indication of impairment, the Centre determines whether it has resulted in a significant adverse change in the expected timing or amount of future cash flows during the year. If so. the Centre reduces the carrying amount of any impaired financial assets to the highest of: the present value of cash flows expected to be generated by holding the assets; the amount that could be realized by selling the assets; and the amount expected to be realized by exercising any rights to collateral held against those assets. Any impairment, which is not considered temporary, is included in current year deficiency of revenues over expenses.

The Centre reverses impairment losses on financial assets when there is a decrease in impairment and the decrease can be objectively related to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognized. The amount of the reversal is recognized in the excess of deficiency in the year the reversal occurs.

Measurement uncertainty (use of estimates)

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Estimates include: the assessed value of the acquisitions held as part of the Centre's collections, accounts receivable and amounts payable for services not billed yet at the time these financial statements were approved and net realizable value of inventory. Actual results may differ from estimates.

Estimates are used to accrue revenues and expenses in circumstances where the actual accrued revenues are unknown at the time the financial statements are prepared. Uncertainty in the determination of the amount at which an item is recognized in the financial statements is known as measurement uncertainty. In these statements such uncertainty exists around the valuation of the acquisitions asset and the related revenues.

Line of credit 3

The Centre has a demand line of credit for \$65,000 (2021 - \$65,000) available from Carpathia Credit Union which was not utilized at fiscal year-end. This line of credit bears interest at the credit union's prime rate and is secured by a line of credit agreement, a guarantee from the Ukrainian Cultural and Educational Foundation Inc. ("Foundation") for \$65,000 (2021 -\$65,000), and an assignment of credit union deposits owned by the Foundation in the amount of \$65,000 (2021 - \$65,000). As at March 31, 2022 the line of credit had a withdrawal balance of \$ nil (2021 - \$ nil).

Deferred capital development 8.

The Centre previously acquired the land located at 16 Martha Street for \$1 from the Province of Manitoba subject to the conditions of completing an expansion project. To date such an expansion has not occurred. A portion of this land was sold to Sport Manitoba Inc. for net proceeds of \$464,232 received in fiscal year 2018.

The Centre must occupy this development by November 1, 2024 and management is seeking an extension to 2026. Should the occupation not occur by the deadline, ownership of this portion of land would revert back to the Province of Manitoba. To date the Centre has spent \$90,619 (2021 - \$68,684) on plans for capital development which are being capitalized in deferred development costs.

Financial instruments 24.

The Centre, as part of its operations, carries a number of financial instruments. It is management's opinion that the Centre is not exposed to significant interest, currency, credit, liquidity or other price risks arising from these financial instruments except as otherwise disclosed.

Interest rate risk

Interest rate cash flow risk is the risk that changes in market interest rates may have an effect on the cash flows associated with some financial instruments. Interest rate price risk is the risk that changes in market interest rates may have an effect on the fair value of other financial instruments. It is management's opinion that the Centre is exposed to the interest rate price risk due to its investment in fixed rate term deposits and investments.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Centre will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The Centre's exposure to liquidity risk is dependent on the sale of inventory, collection of accounts receivable, purchasing commitments and obligations or raising funds to meet commitments and sustain operations.

The Centre has a cash balance of \$256.215 (2021 - \$297.547) and has a \$65.000 (2021 - \$65.000) secured credit facility. As at March 31, 2022, the Centre has not utilized any of this credit facility. Therefore, the Centre's exposure to liquidity risk has been decreased.

Credit concentration

Financial instruments which potentially subject the Centre to credit risk and concentrations of credit risk consist principally of cash and accounts receivable. Management manages credit risk associated with accounts receivable by pursuing collections when they are due.

Government assistance 25

During the year, the Centre qualified for \$82,724 (2021 - \$65,196) of Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy from the Government of Canada as part of Canada's COVID-19 Economic Response Plan to support Canadians and protect jobs during the global COVID-19 pandemic. The Centre also gualified on the following government assistance:

The Company also applied for the Canada Emergency Business Account ("CEBA") program as described in Note 12.

Government assistance has been reflected in the financial statements as other revenue on Statement of Operations. At March 31, 2022, there is \$nil (2021 - \$29,150) included in accounts receivable.

26. Significant event

In March 2020, there was a global outbreak of COVID-19 (coronavirus), which has had a significant impact on businesses through the restrictions put in place by the Canadian, provincial, and municipal governments regarding travel, business operations and isolation/quarantine orders. At this time, it is unknown the extent of the impact the COVID-19 outbreak may have on the Centre as this will depend on future developments that are highly uncertain and that cannot be predicted with confidence. These uncertainties arise from the inability to predict the ultimate geographic spread of the disease, and the duration of the outbreak, including the duration of travel restrictions, business closures or disruptions, and quarantine/isolation measures that are currently, or may be put in place by Canada and other countries to fight the virus.
